## Urochloa mutica

**Appearance:** Perennial grass from widely creeping stolons. Stems reclining at base, rooting at the lower nodes, to 1 m (3 ft) tall when erect, to 3 m (15 ft) long when creeping; nodes swollen, densely hairy.

**Leaves:** Sheaths with dense stiff hairs below, slightly hairy above; ligule a densely ciliate membrane; leaf blades flat, 10–15 mm (0.4–0.6 in) wide and 25–30 cm (10–12 in) long, glabrous but often with small fine hairs at base above and below.

**Flowers:** In a panicle with 8–30, spikelike branches; spikelets short-stalked, 2.7–3.0 mm (0.1–0.12 in) long, mostly paired, in 2–4 rows, appressed to the branches, purplish to green.

**Fruit:** 1.8–2 mm (0.07–0.08 in) long, ellipsoid.

## **Ecological threat:**

Considered one of the world's worst weeds; competes aggressively with other plants. Its fast growth, high productivity, and allelopathic abilities allow it to form dense monocultural stands. FLEPPC Category I
